

that we may delight in your will,


and walk in your ways,

The Lessons

The First Lesson

Exodus 20:1-17

A reading from the Book of Exodus.

Then God spoke all these words:

I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me.

You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments.

You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not acquit anyone who misuses his name.

Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien

resident in your towns. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

Honor your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the Lord your God is giving you.

You shall not murder.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

You shall not covet your neighbor's house; you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

Psalm 19 (We will pray Psalm 19 responsively by half verse)

1 The heavens declare the glory of God, * and the firmament shows his handiwork.

- 2 One day tells its tale to another, * and one night imparts knowledge to another.
- 3 Although they have no words or language, * and their voices are not heard,
- 4 Their sound has gone out into all lands, * and their message to the ends of the world.
- 5 In the deep has he set a pavilion for the sun; * it comes forth like a bridegroom out of his chamber; it rejoices like a champion to run its course.
- 6 It goes forth from the uttermost edge of the heavens and runs about to the end of it again; * nothing is hidden from its burning heat.

7 The law of the LORD is perfect and revives the soul; *

the testimony of the LORD is sure and gives wisdom to the innocent.

- 8 The statutes of the LORD are just and rejoice the heart; * the commandment of the LORD is clear and gives light to the eyes.
- 9 The fear of the LORD is clean and endures for ever; * the judgments of the LORD are true and righteous altogether.

- 10 More to be desired are they than gold, more than much fine gold, * sweeter far than honey, than honey in the comb.
- 11 By them also is your servant enlightened, * and in keeping them there is great reward.
- 12 Who can tell how often he offends? * cleanse me from my secret faults.
- 13 Above all, keep your servant from presumptuous sins;
 let them not get dominion over me; *
 then shall I be whole and sound, and innocent of a great offense.
- 14 Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, *
 O LORD, my strength and my redeemer.

The Second Lesson 1 Corinthians 1:18-25

A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians.

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

The Gospel

John 2:13-22

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the

cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

The Nicene Creed




Have mercy, Lord, for we are sinners in your sight.

A note about the distribution of the Eucharist:

We have returned to offering the common cup, but there will continue to be a separate cup for intinction. If you would like to receive by intinction, please go the left side of the altar rail and the presiding priest will dip the bread in the cup for you. If you would like to sip from the common cup, please go to the right side of the altar rail where the bread and the cup will be offered separately. If you would like to consume only the bread, please also go to the right side and you may simply return to your seat after receiving the bread. As a reminder, we do not kneel at the altar rail one by one. When you go to the altar rail, please fill in all the way to the end. The ministers distributing communion will come around to you.


Post-communion Prayer for a Multi-located Congregation

Second Story and a Youth Service Project on March 10th



Pints with Doubting Thomas: How Can God Allow Suffering?

Pints with Doubting Thomas Prayer

This is a space for people with all levels of doubt and faith; this is the only prayer we will say together, and if you don't feel comfortable saying it, feel free to abstain.

My Lord God,

I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. And the fact that I think I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you. And I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing. Whatever I do, I know that you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face my perils alone. Amen.

Introduction to the Problem of Evil

The God we know and experience is a God of supreme love and goodness, but the world doesn't always reflect that. We know this may be a deeply personal issue for you because you have experienced some terrible suffering in your life. We are so sorry about that, and we do not in any way want to minimize that suffering. We do want to explore the problem of evil so that we can all come to an answer in our own hearts about how we deal with terrible suffering when it arises.

If there is a God who is...

- 1. All Good, (Omnibenevolent)
- 2. All Powerful (Omnipotent)
- 3. All Knowing, (Omniscient)

Why is there still suffering in the world?

Theodicy

Theodicy is a fancy word for providing a reason for how God can exist in a world that experiences suffering.

Today we will look at four traditional answers to this question:

- 1. Perfect Plan Theodicy
- 2. Free Will Defense
- 3. Spiritual Warfare Theodicy
- 4. Soul Making Theodicy


Perfect Plan	Free Will Defense
 Summary: Suffering is a part of God's perfect plan for us The world is under God's control and everything happens according to God's plan so in some way all suffering must be a part of God's plan This theodicy appeals to God's sovereignty or God's supreme power The question of how human free will interacts with God's sovereignty is debated by adherents of perfect plan, but all would agree that in everything that happens, God achieves God's purposes Scriptural Support: Isaiah 46:9-11; Romans 8:28 Tradition: Protestant Reformation, John Calvin 	 Summary: Because of God's love for humanity, God gives people the ability to choose their actions A world of free choice, with all it's problems, is better than a world containing no free creatures If people are truly free, they have the capacity to make good or bad choices The bad choices lead to suffering Bad choices and suffering cause a ripple effect leading to more suffering God is still present fostering goodness in us, but God will not override our free will Scriptural Support: Genesis 2, 3 Tradition: Augustine, Dominant view in non- reformed traditions
Spiritual Warfare	Soul Making
 Summary: We are in a cosmic war zone between forces of good and evil (between God and Satan) In this view, Satan is the cause of all evil and suffering, not God Satan and his demonic forces both act directly in this world and also influence humans to commit evil acts God will win in the end, but for now we are caught in the crossfire We are recruited to play a part in this war 	 Summary: God desires that creatures grow and become loyal to God God knew free will would lead to suffering But, God intends that we grow from suffering so that we become better and more complete people Suffering is purposeful because it instructs us Scriptural Support: Romans 8:17, 2 Cor. 6
Scriptural Support: Matthew 4:1-11, 1 Peter 5:8, Revelation (literal interpretation)	Tradition: Irenaeus, Origen
Tradition: Origen (and other Early Church Fathers)
