

We also invite you to stay with us for coffee hour after the service.






Collect for Purity

The Lessons

The First Lesson

Acts 8:26-40

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this

scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

The Second Lesson

1 John 4:7-21

A reading from the first letter of John.

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit.

And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.




A note about the distribution of the Eucharist:

Crew Neck Size Chart




V-Neck (front on the left, back on the right)

Great News about Mary Cushing, our Deacon in Training

Friends, I am delighted to share with you that Mary Cushing has moved one step closer to becoming ordained as a deacon in the Episcopal Church. Mary met with Bishop Harris last week and was approved as a candidate for Holy Orders. While nothing has been finalized, an ordination date has been tentatively scheduled for somewhere in the Diocese of Virginia in August!

As you may know, deacons serve under the direction of the Bishop. And, in recent years, bishops have used a combination of their own sense of what placement might best suit a new deacon, where the needs for diaconal ministry are strongest, and the deacon's own sense of call, to make those placement decisions. I have let Mary know that we would be delighted to have her continue to serve at St. Thomas as our deacon. And she is prayerfully discerning whether continuing on as our deacon would be a good fit for her. She's also been inspired by our former deacon Mary Beth Emerson, to consider serving as a regional deacon. There are currently no deacons in the Arlington Region, where Mary lives. Finally, Mary might be able to use her Spanish language skills to serve one of the Spanish-speaking congregations in Northern Virginia.

Wherever Mary is ultimately called to serve, I am confident that God will use her many gifts and skills to further the kingdom of God. And I feel profoundly grateful that we have had the privilege of having her with us at St. Thomas for these last two years. Please join me in giving thanks for Mary - and in praying for good discernment for her and for the Bishop.

I feel profound gratitude for Mary and her ministry among us and look forward to celebrating her ordination, God willing and the people consenting, this summer.


Following Up on "Common Ground" and Creation Care

The movie that we viewed on Sunday, "Common Ground," offered a powerful look at the forces that shape much of the food we consume. It provoked many reactions:

- Dismay at the prevalence of insecticides and pesticides in modern agriculture, which inevitably find their way into our food.
- Indignation at the plight of farmers who are pressed to use these poisons, thereby incurring both health risks and financial debt.
- Frustration that this approach has edged out more common-sense farming practices that preserve biodiversity and the land and even sequester carbon.
- And yet, hope: because so-called "regenerative agriculture" is a more sustainable approach to farming that is gaining traction.

Individuals can do their part by supporting local regenerative farmers, buying products with certified regenerative labels, sharing their support on social media, and more. The film's producers have a website with additional guidance and information here. I'd be interested in exploring next steps for the parish, whether related to food or other aspects of creation care. Please let me know if you'd like to chat!




What the Hell is Salvation?
