A Blue Christmas Service

Welcome to this Blue Christmas, a time when we can, with others, acknowledge the "blue" feelings we have at Christmas time, the reasons for them, and offer them to God. This time has been called the "long dark night of the soul" and "the winter of our discontent" in which memories of past experiences and the pain of present experiences can become overwhelming. For some, Christmas Day is the most difficult. For others, it may be Christmas Eve, or New Years Eve, or the beginning of another lonely New Year. In this service, we'll have some singing appropriate to the season, recognizing that this is not a season of joy for everyone. We will invite you to reflect on the pain, the loneliness, and the sadness you may feel and offer it to God for healing and transformation. We pray that you will find hope and comfort in knowing that you are not alone. Always remember that God knows your pain and loves you unconditionally.

Let us pray.

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away; a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace. Lighting the First Candle

We light the first candle to remember those persons whom we have loved and lost. We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices. You may name them now, either silently or aloud. [pause]

We give thanks for the memory that binds them to us this season which anticipates Christmas. May God's eternal love surround them.

The first candle is lit.



A Reading from the prophet Isaiah (40:1, 3-8):


Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken." A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the Lord blows upon it; surely the people are grass. The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever.

Lighting the Second Candle

We light the second candle to redeem the pain of loss: the loss of relationships, the loss of jobs, the loss of health. We name those losses now, either silently or aloud. [*pause*] As we gather up the pain of the past, we offer it to you, O God, asking that into our open hands you will place the gift of peace. Refresh, restore, renew us, O God, and lead us into your future.





A reading from the Gospel of Matthew (11:28-30):


Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light. The word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

A brief silence is kept.

Lighting the Third Candle

We light the third candle to remember ourselves this Christmas time. We pause and remember the past weeks, months, and for some of us, years of difficult times. We remember the poignancy of memories, the grief, the sadness, the hurts, the pain of reflecting on our own mortality. We name those hurts and challenges now, either silently or aloud. [pause] Let us remember that light defeats darkness.

The third candle is lit.



A reading from the Gospel of John (1:1-5, 14):

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. The word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

A brief silence is kept.

Lighting the Fourth Candle

We light the fourth candle to remember our faith and the gift of hope which God offers to us in the Christmas story. We remember that God, who shares our life, also promises us a place and time where pain and suffering will be no more. Let us remember the one who shows the way and who goes with us into our tomorrows.

Surely I know the spring that swiftly flows **Even during the night.**
