

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A Penitential Order


If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God, who is faithful and just, will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

Confession and Absolution of Sin

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor. *A time of silence*. Together, let us pray: God of all mercy, we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives. We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created. We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the evil we have done, and the evil done on our behalf. Forgive, restore, and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ, that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through the grace of Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

During the singing of the Trisagion (found on Page 4), children from Pre-K to 3rd Grade are invited to follow the crucifer to Children's Chapel.

The First Lesson

Romans 10:8b-13

A reading from Paul's letter to the Romans.

"The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart" (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

The Gospel

Luke 4:1-13

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

After his baptism, Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone.'"

Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, "To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him.'"

Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written, 'He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you,' and 'On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone.'"


Lord, who throughout these forty days, For us didst fast and pray, Teach us with Thee to mourn our sins, And close by Thee to stay.


God of all power, Source and Sustainer of the Universe, you are worthy of glory and praise. **Glory to you for ever and ever.**



Risen Lord, be known to us in the breaking of the Bread.


God of our ancestors; Redeemer and Mother of Israel; God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ: Open our eyes to see your hand at work in the world about us.

A Pilgrimage with the Stations of the Cross

ST THOMAS EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN MCLEAN, VA

MARCH 9TH AFTER CHURCH AT 11:10 A.M. MARCH 18TH AT 6 P.M. WITH MARGARET ADAMS PARKER & REV'D DR. KATHERINE SONDEREGGER. SOUP AND SALAD DINNER. MARCH 23RD, 30TH, AND APRIL 6TH AFTER CHURCH AT 11:10 A.M.

The stations of the cross originated in the old city of Jerusalem, giving pilgrims to the Holy Land the opportunity to follow in the footsteps of Jesus, as he traveled from his arrest to his death on the cross. Eventually, artists began creating stations of the cross to hang in churches around the world so that pilgrims could make that journey, with the help of visual images, even if they were unable to travel to Jerusalem.

St. Thomas has had a robust history with the stations of the cross, praying these prayers and making this pilgrimage on Good Friday, for many years. This year, through a collaboration with the artist Margaret Adams Parker (Peggy) and Jeff Crigler, we have a new set of the Stations of the Cross that will hang year round in our sanctuary. This year, our Lenten program will be led by Beth Clarke. She'll lead us in an exploration of the history of the stations, we'll experience the service of the Stations of the Cross, and we'll learn ways to use the stations in our own devotions. Mostly we'll meet on Sundays: March 9, March 23, March 30, and April 6. And, on Tuesday March 18, the artist Peggy Parker, along with The Rev. Dr. Katherine Sonderegger (Professor of Theology at Virginia Theological Seminary) will join us for one soup supper. Peggy will talk about her work and Kate will share wisdom from the book they co-wrote called *Praying the Stations of the Cross: Finding Hope in a Weary Land.* If you'd like to purchase the book, you can find it on Amazon where it is available as both a hardcover and a Kindle book: <u>https://tinyurl.com/yc632ct4</u>

PRACTICE GRATITUDE CHANGE THE WORLD

The United Thank Offering (UTO) was begun in 1889 by Julia Chester Emery who hoped to collect the prayers and grateful offerings of The Episcopal Church to support missions abroad. Many of us may remember the little blue "mite boxes" of our youth in which we placed coins as an expression of our thanks. The St. Thomas Episcopal Church Women (ECW) has sponsored UTO for many years to encourage the practice and discipline of gratitude and to raise money for projects that address compelling needs around the world such as clean water, and education.

Last Sunday, youth of our church constructed a **Mighty Mite Box**, designed and assisted by Ray Raymond, which will be placed in the Narthex throughout Lent. There are slips of paper with "I am grateful" or "I am thankful for" on one side. You are asked to note that for which you are grateful on the other side and drop the slip of paper and/or a donation into the box. You are also welcome to take a little blue box home to collect your expressions of gratitude. We will have an Ingathering of little blue boxes after Lent.

You may use some of the following prayers from the UTO Liturgy Booklet throughout the day as you practice gratitude this Lent:

Gratitude Prayer Upon Waking

Gracious God, I have been invited into a new day by your will and mercy. Make my heart grateful for the breaths given, the day that waits for me, and the peace received through remembering your love, regardless of what the day holds. Hold my mind's awareness of your gift, your love, and your faithfulness. May it be for me the preparation I need to begin this new day. Amen.

Gratitude Prayer at Noonday

Gracious God, I come to you at this halfway point of this day, remembering to entrust myself to you not just in beginnings and in endings, but also in life's in-betweens. In anxiety rustled up by the hours that have passed by and in fear of what the hours coming up may hold, may my awareness of your presence and gratitude for the gift of your Son be the agents of strength I need to persevere and see this day's end. Hold my mind's awareness of your gift, your love, and your faithfulness. May it be the nourishment I need to see this day to its end. Amen.

Gratitude Prayer Before Sleeping

Gracious God, I come to you at this close of day to return to the heart of gratitude that set this day into motion. My heart is full, my cup has run over, my day finishes inside of the grace you've shown to me in giving me another day. In each day's uncertainties, pains, joys, and celebrations, I return again and again to my soul's gratitude for your care. Hold my mind's awareness of your gift, your love, and your faithfulness. May it be the calming presence that ushers me into rest. Amen.
